COMMANDER NOEL H. PETREE, JR.

Commander Petree was commissioned an Ensign in 1956 after graduating from the University of North Carolina in the ROTC program.

Following flight training at Pensacola and Corpus Christi he served in VF-13 and VF-74 flying F4D Skyray, F9F Cougar, and F4B Phantom aircraft. He served as Squadron and Air Group Landing and signalling Officer on board the USS ESSEX (CVA-9), USS SHANGRI-LA (CVA-38), and USS FORRESTAL (CVA-59).

He then attended the Naval Postgraduate School at Monterey for advanced training in Air-Ocean Environment. His:next two tours were at sea as Electronic Warfare/CIC Officer on the USS ALBANY (CG-10) and as Navigator on the USS NEWPORT NEWS (CA-148). Washington was next where he served as Operations Directorate of the Organization of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He then completed a tour as Executive Officer on the USS HARRY YARNELL (DLG-17).

As commanding officer of the Warrington since June, 1972, he guided the ship and crew through gunfire support off of Quang Tri, shelling of coastal defence sites in North Vietnam and finally two very damaging explosions. Commander Petree will next command the USS BASILONE (DD-824).






Blast Damages Newport Ship

U.S. destroyer Warrington was damaged by two underwater explosions while firing at positions in North Vietnam from Gulf of

Tonkin, Monday. Warrington is reported beavily damaged and under tow to U.S. naval base at Subic Ray in Philippines. (AP)

Blasts Rip Newport-Based Ship

The Newport-based destroyer Warrington was heavily damaged yesterday by two underwater explosions in the Tonkin Gulf off North Vietnam.

One crewman was injured. The Cruiser-Destroyer Force, Atlantic, headquarters here said the injuries were minor. The man was treated on board and returned to duty. His identity has not been disclosed. The Warrington left the area under her own power. Later she was taken under tow by the salvage ship Reclaimer, which is taking the damaged destroyer to Subic Bay in the Philippine Islands.

Flotilla Two, the Warrington's unit in Newport, released a statement saying the splashes reported "were similar to those previously seen from large callber North Vietnam-ese coast defense guns."

The Warrington was within range of enemy guns, before the explosions, the Navy said, However, the cause of the two explosions crippling the destroyer are still officially undetermined, and the Navy, in the statement refused to rule out "the possibility of ian underwater mine explosion."

rington "exceeds that normally associated with misses by gunfire."

Metal fragments were found on the deck of the destroyer after the explosions, the Navy disclosed, but the Newport spoksman said these are also unidentified.

The fragments "have been forwarded to the appropriate authorities for analysis," and the statement, which originate d with the commander in chief of the Pacific Fleet in Honolulu.



According to the Navy, the damaged destroyer is expected to arrive under tow today at the Subic Bay Navel Base in the Philippines.






